Food Market

CEAP was founded as a food shelf in 1972 and our food programs remain an integral part of our services. Our Food Market offers access to a variety of nutritious food, an **important building block in creating long-term health and stability.**

Food is a basic human right and is one of the cornerstones of a happy and healthy life. CEAP knows that this right involves not just having food, but having **reliable access to a variety of nutritious, culturally appropriate food:** having the dignity to be able to choose the right food for each of our unique needs, and doing so **in a space that is welcoming, loving, and shame-free.**

Each grocery order at CEAP contains **all the essentials for well-rounded meals for a family.** CEAP offers options for our neighbors of all different cultures, diets, and preferences to ensure everyone is nourished in a way that is most fulfilling to them. We also believe in **celebrating our community** and helping our neighbors **nourish their spirits** through “special” items like birthday cakes and holiday baking items!

This year, CEAP implemented a new online intake and scheduling system which allows **improved curation of grocery orders** as we continue to operate using a curbside model.

Connecting neighbors with resources and information provides every household with knowledge to make the right decisions for every family and every neighbor.

During the pandemic, CEAP was selected to facilitate federal CARES Act funds because of **our roots as a trusted emergency response organization that works both efficiently and with care**.

Senior Programs

Our **senior neighbors are often most impacted by food insecurity** due to factors like financial strain and a lack of access to transportation, as well as other barriers to visiting CEAP and preparing meals themselves.

From delivering meals right to their door through Meals on Wheels to providing healthy items for seniors to pick up at curbside, our programs are here to **provide independence, dignity and opportunities for health** for every senior along the way.

CEAP is a provider of federally funded and locally partnered programs that **meet seniors where they are** in the spectrum of health and independence. Both our NAPS and Silver Selects programs offer healthy food in an accessible way to **keep our seniors active and vibrant**.

CEAP also **delivers groceries directly** to our senior and disabled neighbors who are able to prepare meals for themselves but face barriers to visiting CEAP, such as mobility challenges or a lack of transportation. Senior grocery delivery **honors our neighbors' autonomy and dignity** in making the choices that are best for their individual nutritional needs, while **removing barriers** they may experience in accessing the food they both need and prefer. Together we are growing a healthier community where our neighbors of all ages and abilities can thrive!

Seasonal & Community Programs

CEAP is an expert at **resource navigation**: when a neighbor visits CEAP, we work with them to identify other unmet needs that CEAP and our partners can assist with. This **“whole person” approach**, in which we form meaningful relationships and recognize that hunger is a symptom of something greater, propels each neighbor into greater health, stability, and independence.

Farm Fresh Fest is a **celebration of our community and an opportunity** for neighbors to receive fresh, in-season produce in a safe, inclusive, and welcoming atmosphere. 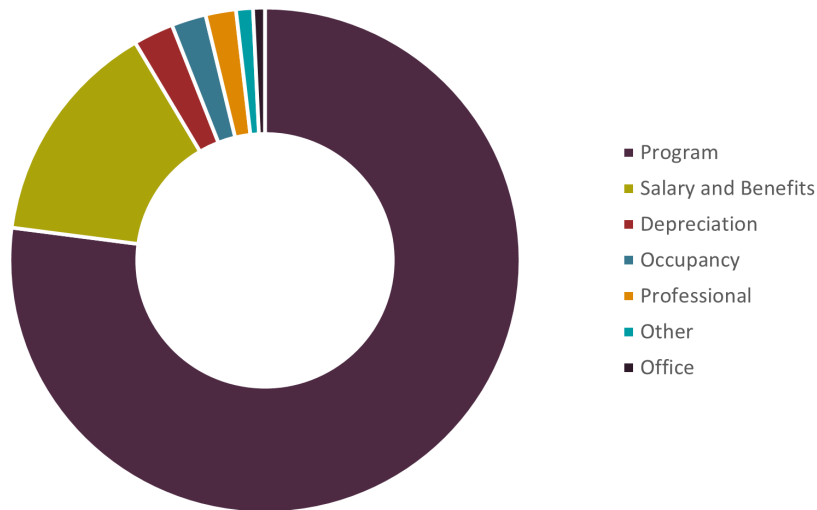
